### 1. Achievement Statements/Report for 1991-92 Objectives

#### GOAL #1. - DESIGN A NEW FIELD CASE INCIDENT REPORT THAT CONFORMS TO THE NATIONAL INCIDENT BASED REPORTING SYSTEM.

Through the Police Chiefs Association of Will County a county wide Incident Report was developed that conforms with the new Incident Based Reporting System (NIBERS). This new report will be implemented as soon as printing can be arranged. The NIBERS requirements are effective January 1, 1993. (COMPLETED)

#### GOAL #2. - REVIEW AND UP-DATE THE DEPARTMENT'S POLICY & PROCEDURE MANUAL. RE-WRITE POLIIES THAT PARALLEL THE STANDARDS FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES.

This yearly agenda item is critical to the efficient operation of the department. Not all of the eight hundred plus standards apply directly to this department but many do. Every new policy that is drafted is reviewed by supervisory personnel and their staff for applicability and operational effectiveness. Every policy must withstand a yearly review before being up-dated. (CARRY-OVER)

#### GOAL #3. - UP-DATE THE COLLEGE'S TRAFFIC AND PARKING CODE.

This revision is currently waiting to be Lodged by the college's Board of Trustees. The significant changes in the Code are (1) elimination of the requirement of student parking decals, (2) the minimum fine increased from \$2 to \$5, (3) fine increase for Fire-Lane/Fire Hydrant and Visitor Parking from \$5 to \$10, (4) fine collection changed from 10 school days to 15 calendar days, (5) the fine for Handicapped Violation parking increased from \$50 to \$75 (increased by state law). #### GOAL #4. - REDESIGN THE TRAFFIC APPEALS SYSTEM

The revisions to the Traffic and Parking Code and the Appeals System involved the college's Student Government Association. Many of the suggestions initiated by the SGA were incorporated. The revised Appeals system will be implemented upon approval of the Traffic And Parking Code by the Board of Trustees.

The changes in the Appeals System are; (1) discontinued requiring pre-payment of citations when an Appeal is made. The individual will be placed on a "restriction" pending payment or appeal of the citation, (2) a person may appear in person before the Appeals Committe for testimony. (COMPLETED)

GOAL #5. - DESIGN THE FORMAT NEEDED TO COLLECT REPORTED DATA THAT IS REQUIRED BY THE STUDENT SECURITY ACT.

The distribution of data required by the Student Security Act begins this September. Criminal data will be distributed for the Main Campus and the Renaissance Center for the first year. The new North Campus will fall into this required reporting information in September of 1993. The data collection format was designed to provide information on both a calendar year basis and the college's fiscal year. The yearly report that is submitted reflects data from both campuses. A new computer spread sheet program has been purchased to accommodate the data collection and storage efforts. (COMPLETED).

GOAL #6. - FORM A CRIMINAL INTELLIGENCE UNIT WITHIN THE DEPT.

With the sudden surge of local street gang members invading the college the need for a combined effort of local police agencies became very evident. A networking system of most local agencies has been formed and was responsible for identifying twenty known local gang members that were registered students in the fall term of 1991. It should be noted that none of the twenty gang members returned for the spring term. Another fifteen gang members were identified in the spring term as registered students. It is not known at this time if any of the identified street gang members have re-registered for the fall 1992 academic term. The criminal intelligence unit will continue to work on gang identification and coordinating the information with other local agencies.
